Holidays Update

Jewish High Holidays (October 2-12): The High Holy Days of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur celebrate the New Year. The holidays themselves are only two or three days total (some observe Rosh Hashanah for two days and some for just one), but the ritual and engagement of the High Holiday period includes the 10-day period between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Jewish holidays fall on varying days of our common calendar each year because they use a lunar rather than a solar one. The new year is celebrated by acknowledging, apologizing and atoning for any mistakes or grievances they made the previous year. The high holidays are the most important holidays to Jews worldwide; even Jews who do not regularly celebrate most rituals or holidays may go to synagogue for them.

Yom Kippur is a 24-hour fast from sundown to sundown, when they atone in earnest and pray until the break-fast after the sun sets. A good Rosh Hashanah greeting is "L'Shanah Tova," which means Happy New Year.

Native American Day (September 27th): In several states, Native American Day is observed on the fourth Friday of September to honor and celebrate the culture, heritage, and contributions of Native Americans. This day is an opportunity to acknowledge the deep-rooted history and enduring presence of Native peoples in our nation. It serves as a reminder to respect and learn from the diverse indigenous cultures that have shaped our land
