Thank you to the Masons. As you all know, the Holley Hall has no kitchen.

Food Truck outside?

Last year, we had around 66 people at the town meeting and maybe 20 on ZOOM. That is not many, considering we have over 3000 residents.

Bi-weekly notices about Town Meetings will be helpful.

Consider a new day and location for future Town Meetings. Starksboro is on Saturdays at the elementary school and has a healthy turnout from the community.

I think these are all excellent ideas. It sounds like the newer, younger citizens want to meet on a weeknight at 5:30ish with food being available to purchase. I believe the current attendees will continue to come to the meeting regardless of the time. Unfortunately, Janet and I have scheduled a vacation with an open ended return date that will be in early March, so I will be unable to support the meal idea.

The Masons will continue to provide snacks and beverages free of charge regardless of the format. I think the idea of selling food is potentially a good idea, but a balance needs to be found where the profit potential is attractive for a group to want to undertake but not so expensive that people won't want to spend a lot of money (affordability is indeed a popular buzzword in VT these days. Perhaps a youth group might be interested in offering babysitting services (Scouts, Young Life, an athletic team...). If I was going to be around, the

Masons would offer to do the food with 3 options such as chicken 'n biscuits or chili or veggie lasagna at the price of \$4 each.

I think the publicity campaign is crucial and I agree that multiple posts on the FPF is probably the best vehicle to get the word out. Personally, I'm not one much for social media, Facebook, Instagram, but for those of you who are, putting the FPF posts on social media can't hurt. Cecil

New in town and looking for friends? Come to town meeting! Meet Bristolites from all walks of life with an even wider range of opinions. Share in the fun and connection of building community and caring for this great place!

Someone once said that you should have a friend of the age of every decade. Do you? Are you missing a decade or two? Come pick your young and old friends at Bristol Town meeting. Hear them out, see their smile and their passion, and connect!...Etc, etc, etc. Anyway, happy to help with any of this!

ORIGINAL SUGGESTIONS (2024)

I have a slightly different opinion about how to get more people to participate. I don't think changing the date or time will make much difference. Monday nights work for some and Saturdays work for others. I think people aren't coming because they don't know how valuable and important it is to make a priority.

I would suggest putting energy into a simple but fun year long publicity campaign about the value of town meeting and perhaps recruiting volunteers who haven't come regularly to help with having some food and babysitters. I always brought my kids to town meeting when I lived in Huntington so they could grow up seeing and absorbing civic engagement. Plus all their friends were there.

For me, town meeting gives me hope for democracy. I have left every single one I've attended feeling good and renewed. It's a live example of civic engagement and how to agree without creating division. I always change my mind a few times with each discussion about the articles.

Robert Bernstein was right when he said this on March 4th, we, the residents of Bristol, need town meeting. It's a social bonding event that creates the cohesion we need to survive. We need it to remember that we need to—and can--work it all out together. Town meeting shows us how to do that. I don't think a lot of people know how to do that anymore. They certainly don't see it on social media and in our state and national governing structures.

So my encouragement would be to promote it more rather than fiddle with the logistics. Interview people and post snippets on social media and You Tube and then direct people there to view them. Include quotes from the interviews in Front Porch Forum. Maybe NEAT TV would have some funny outtakes from previous ones that they could get an intern compile to show that we do hard work there but don't take ourselves too seriously. I'm spitballing ideas here but I can imagine there would be some not too onerous things you could do throughout the year to get people thinking about it and planning to go.

Responses emailed to me:

1) yes 2) I would love to see town meeting held on Saturday 3) Absolutely 4) More than likely, yes. 5) YES. I'd attend Saturday! I used to go when I lived in a town where it was "Town Meeting Day" and all schools and jobs were closed and folks got together to potluck and discuss. People of all (or many anyway) walks of life, sharing a meal, then politely engaging in discourse. I will make a point to start attending regularly, but I would certainly be more likely to come if it was not so late at night! Even more likely if I had the day off by my employer. Why is that not a statewide requirement?

Responses posted on FPF, excerpted here:

1) Nope. As a person in my 30s ... Saturday is the least likely day, and midday is the worst.... 2) I'm another person in my 30s. Not Saturdays, because people like to plan trips and fun things to do on the weekends. Maybe instead of starting the Town Meeting at 7pm on a weekday, can we move it up a bit earlier, say 5pm? 3) Starting at 5pm would be great. May give some group an opportunity to sell light dinner (ie, soup, sandwiches, hot dogs or something similar). 4) I've been asking around to see if younger people would go if the time/day was different and there is a mixture of answers. ... a weeknight is preferred... but earlier, perhaps 5 or 5:30. ... perhaps several home-made soups with good bread and butter... 5) When I was a young person growing up here in Bristol, Town Meeting Day was the community event of the year - for all ages. There was no school that day. Businesses were closed. ...it was a school assignment to go to Town Meeting, and there was a report on what we learned that day... we came to be a closer community that honored the big and little needs with good intentions and good arguments. It was face-to-face and heart- toheart, and there was great respect for all. Food and drink were served and shared - lunch for all! ...maybe we could... re-make it what we always intended it to be? ... I would be there then, and I would bring my knitting.

End responses. The above has me thinking about keeping it Monday, but starting at 5:30 or 6, with dinner available. Organizations who already make dinner in Bristol as a fundraiser,

would you be up for serving us? What is the least expensive, healthy, not too messy dinner you could offer? Cost? How many dinners are you used to making? Cubbers, would you make us pizzas one Monday a year?
